

Community Leadership Project Planned By Jewish Federation

Under the chairmanship of Charles Sabin, secretary of the Federation, and at the direction and approval of the Federation officers, a project is nov under way to build a corps of leadership potential for our Jewish community.

The impetus for the plan came from the experiences of the last few years in attempting to secure campaign workers at all levels, from the top chairman down to solicitors, as well as suitable candidates for direc-tors of the boards of the various local service agencies of the Federation, as well as the Federation itself.

Using the experiences of other communities in developing similar projects, including Paterson, N. J., Wercester, Mass., Cleveland, O., and Kansas City, Mo., the Trenton project for developing community leadership is a two-part proposition.

Sunday is D-Day for the Jewish Community Center, which will dedicate its 40-acre site in Ewing Township for a new center, setting off a month-long \$250,000 fund raising campaign to complete the \$650,000 project. Edward A. The Historical Research Committee, in charge of the project, is headed by Judge Sidney Goldmann and Nathan Kramer. Bernard Alexander as co-chairman of the Religious Activities Committee together with Rabbi Joshua O. Dear George:

Just a few hurried notes in answer to your letter of March 14 re Louis Kaplan's letter.

First I will get a few gripes off my chest. I get very annoyed when some people toot their own horn unnecessarily so. After all, I think that everybody knows just how much work Louis did on the preliminary stages of this project, and I think everybody knows he was once designated as architect. Other people were also designated as architect at one time and are not carrying a chip on their shoulder. Also, many other people have contributed their personal time, energy and professional service on a free basis without shouting about it from the roof tops.

Secondly, it is spitefully unnecessary for him to insist so strongly that he is desirous of cooperating with Mr. Kahn. It probably would have been much better if he really had cooperated with Mr. Kahn and the committee.

Lastly, I always get extremely annoyed when someone says "You send me my money and I will pay my pledge." I was always under the naive impression that pledges were made regardless of any possibility of making a personal gain from the project.

Now to get down to a few real comments: Mr. Kaplan was engaged as an associate architect for the new Trenton Jewish Community Center. His duties and responsibilities were broadly defined at that famous meeting one Sunday morning last Fall. Included among those general duties were those of consulting with the Construction Committee, doing the liaison work with local authorities, and assisting in gathering site information. I, as a member of the Construction Committee, was aware of what his duties were as associate architect. I think the other members of the Construction Committee were also aware of them.

During the winter months when we met very frequently at Harvey's house and at the present Jewish Center Building, Mr. Kaplan was usually present. I positively recall that at the earlier meetings Mr. Kaplan was asked for his opinion on a swimming pool by various members of the Construction Committee. I do not recall how fully he answered the Committee's questions concerning the swimming pool.

I was never aware that anyone on the committee ignored Mr. Kaplan, or that anyone was rude to him.

Mr. Kaplan states that the committee acted with great speed in proceeding with the erection of the swimming pool. I can certainly see nothing wrong with a committee that does not dally. It does not always necessarily follow that haste makes waste. The decision to proceed with the pool first was a majority decision of the Construction Committee. It was presented as such to a Board of Directors Meeting at which you presided. Kaplan was present at that Board of Directors Meeting not only as associate architect but as a member of the Board. I recall that Mr. Kaplan made no comment for or against the construction of the pool at this time.

I will say this, that at several prior meetings of the committee during a discussion of the pool and a basic site layout Mr. Kaplan did state that although the committee may be very anxious to build the pool this summer, that they should not proceed with it unless they had the opportunity to study to the committee's satisfaction the site plan, and to accept it as the proper site plan for the Center. I certainly do agree with him on that statement because I, myself, did make similar statements as a member of the committee.

I think you also know how I personally feel about proceeding with the pool before the entire project has been planned in detail. However, it does not mean that proceeding with the pool is wrong. It is purely a matter of personal opinion and since both the committee and the Board agreed to this it by majority vote, it certainly cannot be considered wrong. In other words, Mr. Kaplan was not ignored or snubbed by the members of the committee. His advice was asked. Sometimes it was given, sometimes it was withheld. In those cases where it was given it was not necessarily accepted. -

The committee was under no obligation to accept the advice of either Mr. Kaplan or Mr. Kahn, both these people being in the employ of the committee. The committee acted with great speed in deciding to build the swimming pool first but not improperly so. Perhaps details of the budget were not prepared in accordance with Mr. Kaplan's concepts of best architectural procedure. That is also a matter of personal opinion.

I feel that Mr. Kaplan was in an extremely awkward position with both this committee and the architect, Mr. Kahn, considering he had to work rather strenuously in order to secure his appointment as associate architect. Under those circumstances it is very difficult for most people to forget and forgive.

It is too bad that this rumpus has to come up now but I am sure in your own inimitable manner you will be able to settle it satisfactorily.

Enough said.

Dear Mr. Warren:

For several years I had been looking forward to the time when actual planning and construction of the new Community Center Building would commence. That was true under my original designation as Architect, following which I readily helped with various sites which were being considered, Digging of Test Pits for these sites, Zoning, Swimming Pool at the presently owned Day Camp, Consultations with Representatives of J.D.C., and numerous problems presented in connection with the existing building on South Stockton Street.

It was true even after I learned that I was to be an Associate Architect to Mr. Louis I. Kahn of Philadel-phia. I sought to cooperate to the utmost and do all that I possibly could do to become an important part of this major project for our community life in Trenton. With that in view and also in an effort to familiarize myself with everything that was happening, I attended meetings of the Building Committee regularly.

I regret to say, however, that the time has come when I feel compelled to inform you of happenings which I cannot, in justice to you or myself, countenance or overlook. Although, it was my intention to render maximum service within the scope of my duties, I have not received the expected cooperation or been afforded the opportunity to do so. Not only has my opinion not been sought by the Building Committee about many of the details, but many times I have attended Committee meetings without having been apprised in advance of the recommendations and estimates which were to be presented for Committee action, which in turn left me with the feeling that I was being ignored and deliberately so.

Of even greater concern is the speed with which, and the manner in which, the Building Committee is proceeding with the erection of an outdoor swimming pool. You will recall that at a meeting of your Board held on February 7, 1955 the Building Committee, on its own recommendation, was empowered to award contracts not to exceed the sum of \$110,000.00 (exclusive of Architects' fees) for a swimming pool. At that meeting, plans and estimates were submitted, and it may be fairly stated that the impression created was that they were thought out and substantially accurate. It now appears, as I have gathered from subsequent meetings, that the estimates which were presented for such items as construction of a bath house, grading, paving, sodding, lighting, drainage, water supply, etc. were mere guesses and were not based upon the actual conditions as they may be found to exist later.

It may surprise you, but the first time that I, the Associate Architect, ever saw the plans or heard of the estimates was at the Board meeting above mentioned. Such being the case and in reliance on what was stated and also because I did not want to appear to be an obstructionist or working at cross roads with the Committee, I refrained from volunteering any opinion. Nor was my opinion requested.

It is my personal conviction that the project should be planned in its entirety with a certain amount of detail before the commencement of actual construction of any portion of it. In view of the funds which will be available, a clearer picture of the entire scope should be had before commencing the construction of a swimming pool. Otherwise, important units may have to be deleted because of lack of funds.

I desire to participate in a project where I can render real service and only if my opinion is considered to be of some value. Since I am not satisfied that this is the situation in this case, it is my belief that our mutual interests will best be served if I disassociate myself from any further activity in connection with the project, and I therefore respectfully request that you consider this letter as such. I have given this action of mine great deliberation and I am not doing it in a moment of haste or with the slightest anger.

Immediately upon receipt of this check, I shall forward the balance of \$1200.00 owing on the pledge made by Mrs. Kaplan and myself.

Upon motion made and seconded it was passed that we dispense with the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting.

Mr. Warren stated that two important matters were to be discussed at this meeting: First, a report on the state of our finances; and second, a report of the Construction Committee on the selection of architects.

I. FINANCE REPORT - Mr. Robert Watkins reported on the present state of our finances. It was stated that quite a large number of cards were still out on the drive and that this could not therefore be a complete report.

Total Assets: \$431,000

\$ 66,000 Cash 10,000 U.S. Saving Loan 50,000 Federal Savings & Loans 60,000 State of Israel Bonds 245,000 Receivable pledges

It was moved, seconded and passed that this report of the Finance Committee be accepted. Mr. Bernard Alexander pointed out the fact that in the matter of Bonds of Israel loans they are not binding future action of the Board of Directors.

II. CONSTRUCTION COMMITTEE REPORT by H. Harvey Saaz, Chairman

Recommendation:

Architect: Louis I. Kahn of Philadelphia

Associate Architect: Louis Kaplan

Advisory Board of Architects: John Hirsch, Chairman

Franklyn Spiezle, Stanley Dube, Robert Kahn

Louis I. Kahn will have overall responsibility for design, drawing and supervision. Mr. Kaplan is to be available for active consultation with Mr. Kahn, aid in supervision without responsibility and act as liaison between architects.

Fee: Based upon recommendation of N. J. A. I. A.

7% overall for Mr. Louis Kahn,

less low for Louis Kaplan,

less \$2500 to Mr. Kaplan for work done for J.C.C. in past seven years.

As for the Advisory Committee of Architects, Mr. Kahn will reimburse them if
he uses them in any capacity.

After some discussion, a motion was made, seconded and passed that the recommendation of this Construction Committee be accepted.

A motion was made by Judge Goldmann and seconded by Robert Marcus stating that the plans and specifications, at such time as the Construction Committee considers that the overall plan is ready, should be submitted for Board consideration and approval. This miltion was adopted.

A motion made by Dr. Nurock and seconded by M. George Coleman was adopted. It stated that the Executive Committee shall be and is authorized to enter into a contract with the architect embodying the principles in the report of the Construction Committee as previously adopted. Upon approval by the Executive Committee the officers of the Association are authorized to execute such contract.

The meeting was then adjourned.

Summary of Board discussions - re: Architects
Based on Board Minutes

- Aug. 27, 1951 Architects The Executive Committee recommended that Louis Kaplan be appointed main architect and that Kramer and Hirsch be his associates. Question arese concerning fees and, while this information was not available at the present time, it was announced that in all probability these would be the lowest fees set by the American Board of Architects. The Jewish Welfare Board architects might also be invited to serve as consultants. On motion by Charles Sabin, seconded by Robert Marcus, it was passed that the ratification of the Executive Committee be accepted subject to a satisfactory arrangement with all concerned.
- Nov. 29, 1953 A motion was made by Mr. Rudner and seconded by Mr. Sabin that the Board give its approval that one of the J.W.B. Board of Architects be used. This motion was passed.

Executive Committee - Based on Executive Committee Members

Aug. 1, 1951 - Architect - Dr. Nurock reported that members of the Executive Committee were invited to go with him and H. Harvey Saaz to the J.W.B. office Thursday morning, August 9th, to review building plans of Centers now being developed and also to discuss the possibility of the J.W.B. assistance as consultant to the architect. This consultation service would be charged at the rate of 1½% and is to be paid from the local architect*s fee.

It was recommended by Leon Levy that Louis Kaplan and Harold Kramer be contacted individually and called to work out the question of relationship as associates. Leon Levy felt that both Louis Kaplan and Harold Kramer should be brought together as quickly as possible to review the problem of the architect arrangements with the Executive Committee.

H. Harvey Saaz felt that by invitation a national contest should be organized, so that we can secure the best technical thinking in the architectural field for our building plans. Approximately \$5000. to be set aside for this, with the plans to be turned over to the local architect for incorporation and use as the committee may see fit. Sidney Goldmann approved of this approach.

Aug. 16, 1954 - Architects - Dr. E.C. Nurock reporting on conversations with Louis Kaplan, Agreement by architects that Louis Kaplan would serve as architect with Kramer & Hirsch as associate architects. Motion on this was made by George Warren and seconded by Robert Watkins to recommend to Board of Trustees on selection of local architects. approved unanimously.

Executive Committee - Based on Executive Committee Members

Oct. 23, 1952 - The first question on the agenda was the matter concerning the architects who were to work on the building. It was recalled that at a previous meeting it had been decided to engage Louis Kaplan and the firm of Kramer and Hirsch. Dr. Nurock informed us that satisfactory arrangements had not been agreed upon between these groups and that it would be necessary to make other arrangements. During the discussion which followed it was the consensus of opinion that Louis Kaplan should be retained plus any associate architect the committee would bring in to assist him.

A motion was made by Leon Levy and seconded by George Warren that the Building Committee be empowered to negotiate the terms of a contract directed towards the retention of Louis Kaplan as the architect and to report back the form and content of the agreement to the Executive Committee for approval prior to the execution. This motion was carried.

- May 6, 1954 a. Problem of architect It was felt essential to decide as soon as possible on selection of architect. After discussion on methods and kind of architect desired, it was recommended that Dr. E.C. Nurock should meet with L. Kaplan and discuss with him that the Executive Committee wants to have a free hand in selection of architect and that he will be considered along with others.
 - b. George Warren suggested that H.H. Saaz open negotiations with Leon Spector of the Jewish Welfare Board as consulting architect. H.H. Saaz felt that Construction Committee should have authority to use and select special consultants and resources such as pool, engineers, landscape, etc. His committee will consult with Executive Committee on any fees. This was approved.
- June 24, 1954 Architects Next on the agenda was a review of the policy and procedures in selection of an architect and also preparation of architects plans. Mr. Saaz in reporting on this matter also reviewed the progress toward construction. After a brief discussion it was decided to authorize the construction committee to proceed with the engagement of architects and to report to the Executive Committee as soon as possible.





FILTER COMPLETELY OVERHAULED: MANY IMPROVEMENTS ADDED: RECORD ATTENDANCE EXPECTED

A complete overhauling of the filtering system of our outdoor swimming pool at the new Center site is now underway.

You will be interested to know that immediately after the pool was closed last summer, the Pool Committee under the cochairmanship of Aaron Edelman and Dan Kramer, made a thorough study of the situation. The filter was dismantled and parts were sent to the manufacturer for analysis. A consultation was held with several experts in the field for purpose of determining what should be done to assure the continuous clear appearance of the water in the pool. After several months of study and consultations, the Pool Committee decided to follow the advice of the experts and completely overhaul the system, replace all parts with first grade stainless steel parts and make any other changes in the filtering system that were recommended. The company doing the work assures us that our beautiful and modern Center

pool will again have it's crystal clear look.

The contracts call for comsletion of all work by the middle of May. Dan Kramer, co-chairman of the Pool Committee and a chemical engineer in his own right, was exceptionally helpful in tackling the problem. The Pool Committee is most grateful to him for his efforts and


